

1 out of 5 incarcerated people in the world is incarcerated in the U.S.

Eleven million people around the world are in prisons and jails. The U.S. locks up a larger share of these people than any other country, with as many incarcerated as the 194 countries with the smallest incarcerated populations combined.





Incarceration is just one piece of the much larger system of correctional control

The U.S. justice system controls almost 7 million people, more than half of whom are on probation.





Mass incarceration directly impacts millions of people But just how many, and in what ways?

Incarcerated today

in prison or jail
2.3 million

Formerly incarcerated

in state or federal prison
4.9 million

Ever convicted of a felony

19 million

Most face "collateral consequences" even after their sentence ends

> such as voting, housing, education, employment, and other restrictions

Have a criminal record 77 million

Have an immediate family member who has ever been to prison or jail

113 million adults






Racial and ethnic disparities in correctional facilities

Whites are underrepresented in the incarcerated population while Blacks are overrepresented.








Most people in prison are poor, and the poorest are women and people of color


